OPUS DEI NEWS

The two new Venerables

Montse Garses

Montse was born in Barcelona in 1941. She had a lively personality and loved music, sports and folk dancing. She was always cheerful and could easily make friends. At 16, she joined Opus Dei, seeing that God was calling her to this path. She learned to live in peace, the peace that comes from living close to God. In December, 1957, she began to feel pain in her left leg. Six months later, before she turned 17, she was diagnosed with Ewing's Sarcoma in the femur. She accepted the cancer with serenity and joy and throughout her illness, she manifested a contagious joy. Many of her friends and schoolmates became closer to God when they came to visit her. In her pain, she encountered Jesus and Mary. Those close to her witnessed her progressive union with God. She died on Holy Thursday, March 26, 1959. She found God in the loving fulfillment of her work and studies, in the small things of each day.

Isidoro Zorzano

Isidoro was born in Buenos Aires in 1902. When he was three years old, his family moved to Spain thinking they would eventually return to Argentina. In Spain, he met Josemaría Escrivá in Barbastro and the two became friends. Isidoro studied Industrial Engineering and after graduating, he sensed a deeper spiritual restlessness. He decided to meet up with Josemaría, who by then had already been a priest for five years. Soon after, he decided to join Opus Dei. When the Civil War broke out, many went into hiding including Josemaría. Because of his Argentinian passport, he was free to move around Spain during the war. In those years, he helped many people and kept the members of Opus Dei united to Josemaría and to one another by obtaining provisions and food, giving up much of what was needed for himself. In 1943, he was diagnosed with malignant lymphoma. He accepted this illness with courage and abandonment to God's will. A nurse recalled: "He never needed anything for himself, everything was good and he never complained."

Isidoro continues to help from heaven those in severe economic hardships with such favors as receipt of unexpected groceries, provision to pay for electricity that was cut-off, getting a job, or paying for an operation. "...and he does not let us down."

As a Cooperator, when I reflect on the impact of St. Josemaría Escrivá and Opus Dei on my life, I feel deep gratitude. Looking back, I left the church in my teen years. However the Lord in his great mercy left the ninety nine sheep to find me. After a profound conversion experience as an adult, I entered into a personal relationship with Jesus, an ability to truly pray for the first time, and a deep desire for Sacred Scripture, the Sacraments and catechesis. However I recognized something was askew. I lacked a unity of life between my work, family life, friendship circles and faith life. This is when the Lord introduced me to Opus Dei. After reading about Opus Dei from afar, I wandered into Walnut Grove for a recollection. Someone noticed the dazed and confused stranger and warmly greeted and showed me around. From that start Opus Dei entered my life.

The formation I have received from Opus Dei and the writings of St. Josemaría Escrivá have resonated with what I find in my heart and have deeply formed who I am today in too numerous ways to list here. I now feel a unity in my life. The initial thirsts for catechesis and knowledge of Sacred Scripture have been encouraged and greatly helped along as I continue to learn in my quest to have the sure doctrine of a theologian. Opus Dei has shown me how to support a life of prayer through daily norms as I continue to pursue having the piety of a child. St. Josemaría not only teaches me through his writings but has become a spiritual father to me. After the Virgin Mary, he is my favorite friend in heaven. In addition to the formation I am quite grateful for the people. Many heroes who support me by the witness of their faith and friends who have supported me through prayer and listening ears. For me, being a cooperator of Opus Dei means entering into a family of love and action. A family where the Good Shepherd forms his sheep into the saints He desires who go out and do the work of God. ~Christine

I am thankful for my Opus Dei family who listened, visited and supported me especially during the time of my illness. These friendships are a source of inspiration to me. I'm reminded that God in His Mercy surrounds me with good people and little blessings everyday. Ever since, my appreciation for little things intensified. God made me see how little and weak I really am. But instead of getting discouraged, I have learned to work with my weaknesses rather than against them. Through my experience with Opus Dei, I continue to see the value of my frailty and this helps me to depend on Him more. ~Myrna
